# Preparing for the Placement Exam

The ETSC English program is designed to help students develop as readers, and particularly as readers of theological texts. It is not primarily designed to teach either grammar or conversation. In that spirit, the ETSC English placement exam consists of a series of texts, with each text followed by a set of reading questions. Some of the texts are theological in nature, while others are more general. Each placement exam includes both theological and non-theological texts.

The best way to prepare for the exam—and for the ETSC English program as a whole—is to read English texts. Read the Bible in English; read articles online; read an English newspaper; read stories and poems; read, read, read!

While the ETSC English course is not a grammar course, becoming a successful reader of English depends on a solid understanding of English grammar. If you have not used English for some time, or if you know that your knowledge of basic English grammar is weak, the list below gives you an idea of the key topics you should study. This list highlights the grammar topics that students should be familiar with at the time that they enter ETSC. The ETSC English course assumes that students will be familiar with these topics—though not that they will never make mistakes!

(**NOTE:** These topics are not tested directly either on the placement exam or in the ETSC English course. The point is that successful reading depends on a solid understanding of grammar, and these topics are the most basic and essential for successful reading.)

#### Verbs

- o Tenses
  - Present Simple
  - Present Continuous
  - Past Simple
  - Past Continuous
  - Present Perfect
  - Past Perfect
  - Future with "will"
  - Future with "be + going to"
  - Future continuous
- Voices
  - Passive Voice. Be able to recognize and produce the passive form of each of the above tenses.
- o Irregular verbs
- o Modal verbs (e.g., should, can, might, etc.)

#### Nouns

- o Regular & Irregular plurals
- o Countable & Uncountable nouns
- Pronouns

- Subject pronouns
- Object pronouns
- Possessive pronouns
- Possessive adjectives

#### Adjectives

- Comparative adjectives
- Superlative adjectives
- Participial adjectives (i.e., using the present and past participles as adjectives; these usually end in –ing and –ed, respectively)
- Adverbs
- **Articles/Determiners** (a, an, the, some, any)
- **Prepositions** (in, at, on, for, during, while, etc.)
- **Conjunctions & linking words** (and, but, or, because, so, since, therefore, however, though, although, etc.)
